Dear Sir :

I have started this letter addressing you at Deering but come to think of it I had better send this to Igloo as you should be on your way there before this mail can reach Deering. As you may be glad to receive the enclosed as soon as possible I will send this letter to Igloo.

Your letter of Dec. first was received recently. I have read with much interest your contract with between the Cold Storage Co and the Robinson Magids Co and am glad that you have been able to get such a good price for your meat. It is much better than the Nome price. I do not see just why you limited the price for which the meat was to be sold by the store to twenty cents?

I am glad to hear that you have practically straightened up Henrys matters. We will talk over this when we meet.

I shall have to change my schedule and go to Wales after the fair instead of going to Deering with you. This is because I am afraid that if I went north first I would get back here too late to make Wales. So I will go there first and then come around the coast to Deering. I enclose copies of some letters regarding the work of the Government and the Mission at Naervik.
