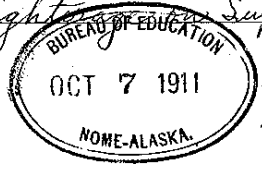

Dear Sir:

A letter from Mr. Evans to Dana O'Kok Thomas dated Sept 1, 1911 is at hand. O'Kok was away at Kotzebue when the Mary Sacks arrived here. Mr. Magids, the store-keeper here had the Eskimos bring the coal, 40 sacks, to the coal house, and place 22 boxes and bundles inside the school building.

Some Eskimos from Cape Prince of Wales brought the 22 bundles from the Mary Sacks to the shores, also 11 sacks of the coal. Four Eskimos here brought the other 29 sacks of coal from the Mary Sacks. They worked about one half day. The Cape Prince of Wales natives were paid by some one else, these Eskimos say. The names of these four Eskimos are Joe Unaleenyah, Leonard Pootu

Joe says they will be satisfied with \$^{9.00}/_{1.00} (Nine Dollars) for their work, that the money can be paid to him and he will pay the others their part.

A shipping receipt for other goods sent from Kotzebue on the Mary Sacks is dated Aug. 18, 1911, so I presume that is the date when these goods were received, although the Eskimos could not tell the date.

I arrived here Sept 14, 1911 hence all my information regarding this matter comes from the Eskimos and Mr. Magids.

Joe said just now that these things came the same day that the other goods did, Aug. 18.

I will await your direction regarding the payment of the above bill.
