Lila is so attractive and is getting too old to be left with her mother, and Jim too needs better care than he regions here.

Please, Mr Shields, do you think we might have some aluminium tea and table or dessert spoons for the hospital. The kind we have now do not bear holling and as I have orders to boil them each time I expect s sometime to find they have utterly disappered. These rust very badly and are roughened by boiling. I also need very much a large double boiler for cooking mush for the patients. I asked for it in the inventory but fear I might hot get it unkess your approve and will ask for especially.
