A party to whom I sent some money- the check for one of these months- has never received it, Was at that time traveling in Europe, and writes me they fear that particular letter was forwarded to them in Germany. The family themselves experienced great difficulty in getting out of Germany.

I am very sorry to put you to any trouble but it will be a very great favor if you can help me in this matter. If the matter entails a great amount of correspondence I shall be very glad to pay a stenographer if you see fit to employ one to lessen the labor for yourself.

Matters are going along very well indeed here . Miss Hawk is awaiting rather impatiently the arrival of the first boat. There are five white ladies in the town at the present time! And we are all on good terms so far!!

We read with great pleasure and interest your journal account of the Reindeer fair. Are you planning to attend OURS at Nourvik next winter?
