In your last letter you mentioned as having sent me under separate cover, enough "statistical blanks", for 4 herds of reindeer, as as they have not yet arrived I am sure they will not be sufficient for my reports this summer. I now have 6 herd to report Mr. Shields has separated the herd at Buckland and ordered them to report to me this year.

If you have any more blanks I should like if you would send me enough

The wind has been quiet now for 3 days and Deering is a fine place to live in the sunshine, but we are wise to the conditions and are ready to move as soon as the ice is out.

The nervous tention of the long wait, is telling on the people but every one is more than ready to go.

We will almost drain Deering Dry of natives when we go, and the w hite people are feeling lonesome already. But ofcourse the Eskimo is nothing to them nor will he ever amount to anything. So they say.

We'll show them. Watch us Grow. Noorvik 1916.

If it comes from Noorvik, its good.
