I will hold this letter for one week. It may be possible that you wrote and that your letter has not arrived.


I wonder if you ever received any reimbursement for the goods that were lost on the "Redfield"? Capt. McKenna is at Wales this winter. I cannot understand why you received part of your goods and not all. Of the hundreds of, yes thousands of boxes that were in that wreck, yours is the only one that no trace can be found. I am still under the impression that your supplies were sent to Kotzebue. I distinctly remember having a hard time knowing what to do with your goods because I knew that you were leaving Shungnak and had not heard where you were going to be placed. I suggest that you

write McKenna a letter stating the value of the goods and what they were. I have tried in several ways to find out if any other school person had received a box of goods that did not belong to them but have never had any but negative answers. You do not state whether they were insured or not. If they were it will be a small matter to have your claim adjusted.

When Mr. Shields arrives have him sub-authorize enough money to cover all expenses that you may have incurred.
