As I wrote you some time ago, there has been a complaint that the coal mined last year and shipped to Barrow and Kotzebus by Capt. Backland was very bad. It is very hard for me to understand that as all the Wainwright coal I ever saw was in good hard lumps. In fact I have noticed that it is quite hard to break. The Chief Engineer of the Bear remarked about that last summer.
